As with New Jersey, it is somewhat overwhelming as I consider the vast number of people By faith Abraham, when he was called, obeyed and set out for a place that he was going to receive as an inheritance. I share my experience with you because it reminds me of Abraham when he got a call from God to make a move. We read that he "...went out even though he did not know where he was going". In other words, Abraham did not know what the future had in store. By faith he stepped out into the unknown.

That's where I make the connection to Abraham's story. I do not know what the future has in store for me and for you, in these next months. However, I do know that all of this is not by chance. I see God's Hand working behind the scenes and the assurance that this is all meant to be. Knowing that God has a good plan for First Saint Paul's, I ask myself: "What can I do to help this church that has some good things going for it?" I pray for God's help and wisdom. Along the way I trust that there will be some of you who will provide needed insight and perspective. Above all, I rely on God's ever-sufficient grace for the tasks ahead.

Again, thank you for being so welcoming to me and my wife, Sandy. I look forward to getting to know you better in the weeks ahead.

The text calls us to think about how the good news of Jesus' birth affects—and even changes—our lives and our attitude toward others.

This year is also the 150th anniversary of the birth of Ralph Vaughan Williams. We will include several of this composer's compositions, as well as other familiar hymns and carols.

The Christmas concert is one of the highlights of the season at First Saint Paul's. A gracious candlelight reception follows the service. We hope that you will invite friends and neighbors.

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Call Committee Updates

Call Committee: Howard Ansorge (Chair), April Szymanski, Laurie Bart, Jen Masengarb, Mike Cacicio, and David Rogner

The call process consists of three basic phases:

- **Phase 1:** Surveying the Congregation and Gathering Information
- Phase 2: Soliciting Nominations, Reviewing Candidates, and Conducting interviews
- **Phase 3:** Presenting a Recommendation to the Church Council and the Voters

The Call Committee has been meeting on a regular basis since early May. In our first meeting on May 2, our advisor from the Northern Illinois District office (Rev. John Prohl, Assistant to NID's President) explained the various aspects of the call process. Based on his advice, the Call Committee has been following the detailed guidelines for the call process set forth in NID's Calling Manual.

In Phase 1 of the call process, the Call Committee's first task required evaluating the congregation's strengths and needs and assessing the community surrounding First Saint Paul's. The purpose of the evaluation was to understand the needs of and opportunities for our congregation, and to determine the pastoral attributes considered most important by the congregation. This process is designed to identify pastoral candidates who might be a good fit for FSP. As an integral part of the evaluation process, the Call Committee developed a survey to gather our congregation

members' personal perspectives on First Saint Paul's strengths, possible areas needing improvement, and pastoral attributes and skills we believe to be most important. The survey was distributed in June and the congregation's response was very strong. Based on the results of the survey, as well as other research (including a review of an extensive amount of demographic data covering our surrounding community), the Call Committee compiled a document known as the Congregational Profile. While assembling the Congregational Profile, the Call Committee moved into Phase 2 of the call process by asking our congregation's members to nominate pastors to include on the list of candidates who might be considered for a call. In July, the Call Committee sent the nomination list to the NID office along with the Congregational Profile. In September, the NID office sent us detailed background information for each pastor on the list as well as additional candidates the NID believed might be a good fit for FSP. The background information provided by NID included a detailed 13-page Self-Evaluation Tool (SET) completed by each pastor.

After each member of the Call Committee studied the candidates' SETs, the Committee met in late September to discuss and evaluate each candidate. Based on this evaluation, the Committee selected which candidates to initially contact to determine whether they would be receptive to receiving a call. This is where the call process stood as of mid-October.

Next, the Call Committee will conduct phone interviews with the candidates who are receptive to a call. To prepare for the interviews, the Committee finalized a list of questions to cover during the interviews. Prior to the interviews, the Committee will send each candidate a copy

of our Congregation Profile to help him evaluate how well his gifts may match the needs of our congregation.

After the candidate interviews are completed, the call process will enter Phase 3 where the Committee submits its recommendation to the Church Council. After clearing the Church

Council, the Call Committee will present a recommendation to the Voters' Assembly. Ultimately, the Voters' Assembly will vote to decide which pastoral candidate to call as FSP's full-time pastor.

As an adjunct to the Call Committee, a sub-committee of the Board of Elders is studying NID's guidelines to formulate a proposed compensation package that will be included in the call documents the congregation will send to the pastor who the voters have decided to call.



Greetings First St. Paul's!

I am the new Chair of Christian Education, Betsy Pennington Taylor. Some of you may know me from Choir or from Children's Messages this Summer. I am so pleased to announce that Sunday School is back! We are a small but perfectly formed five-child group at the moment and have had three sessions thus far. Team Sunday School is: Lou, Lila, Sam, Gabriel, Oswin, and Jacob.

Here is a re-cap of the last three sessions which were sort of "back to school" basic lessons, so that we could get to know each other, what we know about faith, and our relationship to church.

1st Session: Being Members of a Christian Community

What does being members of a Christian Community mean to

us? How does membership influence how we act toward others? For this lesson, we went around the room and shared what God means to us and how being a member of church is important to us and to our families. Then, we all thought of three ways that we could show our devotion to God by our actions and deeds. We wrote or drew pictures to represent helping in our homes and giving in our community. My favorite was "go over to the kid who has no one to play with and include them." Yay! We ended by comparing faith and the church to a living seed that needs to be nurtured to grow, because we were planning an outside theme for the second week!

2nd Session: Growing our Faith and Spreading the Word

For this lesson, Dwight provided some flowers so we could plant them and (hopefully) watch them grow as our faith is growing! We used colored chalk to draw pictures and write inspiration messages on the patio based on the theme of Growing our Faith!

3rd Session: Faith through Music

For this lesson, we learned a hymn. Laurie Bart provided a beautiful board book that she used to teach Lila and now, Holly, the hymn "Now Rest Beneath Night's Shadow". Laurie played the oboe, I played some (very poor) piano, and we had a brief lesson about reading music - about quarter notes, half notes, and rests. After rehearsing the hymn by reading the words and singing, we picked up bells and other percussion instruments to add some extra joyful noise! Steven Wente

was kind enough to let us use the choir loft and that made it particularly special. Just to share with you – it was my love for music that first brought me to FSP, and Laurie and I both feel that music is such an important part of our worship, that it should be imparted to the children of our congregation.

Social Ministry Update

We continue to serve grab & go meals to our **community meals** guests every Saturday morning and also receive and distribute hundreds of grab & go meals every Wednesday morning. The Wednesday meals program benefits the Affordable Recovery Center in Blue Island as well as other community service centers and churches as requests for meals are received through The Chicago Help Initiative, our partner in meals and other social service ministries.

Plans are in place to return to sit-down meals on some Saturday mornings, though these would be breakfast meals with a grab & go lunch for later. More details on this will be provided as we firm up our plans and secure volunteers.

FSP's **foot clinic** continues every second Saturday of the month. It is under the excellent leadership of its founder, Dr. Charlotte Czmiel. She and her fellow volunteer doctors provide much needed expertice and caring attention for our community meals guests as well as hundreds of pairs of gently used and high-quality shoes and plenty of brand new socks.

The Chicago Help Initiative stations both their nurse practitioner and professional social worker on-site at FSP's on Foot Clinic Saturdays (our highest guest attendance day every month) so that our guests may receive medical consulting and referrals to medical care providers as needed. They also can receive assistance with applying for the variety of things necessary for obtaining

AA Meetings

Two groups meet back-to-back every Sunday evening, and we are constantly asked if we can make our facilities available for additional AA meetings during the week.

The demand is great for meeting space, but the supply is very limited. If any FSP's members are interested in volunteering for "front door duty" for AA meetings, please see or call Mike Cacicio, 312-560-7155. job interviews and housing, such as obtaining a photo ID, copies of their original birth certificates, access to a temporary mailing address, etc. These professionals also guide our guests through applications for city- and stateoffered benefit programs.

Thanks to an introduction by Jen Mesengarb to a **Concordia University Chicago** student—and by extension his classmates—we now have up to a dozen Concordia students showing up on selected Saturdays to help with our community meals activities as well as with various projects around the church!

In addition to ministering to our community meals guests—including much appreciated one-on-one visiting time—the students have polished our pews, organized the books in the library, and led by Trustee Dwight Deppen, have completed fairly heavy landscaping work on our patio.

Our FSP-attending **Moody students** continue to volunteer by serving coffee and meals to our community meals guests and provide much needed assistance with sorting hundreds of pairs of donated shoes by size so that our guests can easily find what they need.

Who are Deacons and what do they do?

At the present time, the Deacons have been acting as Greeters at the door for the Sunday Services. A schedule is sent out every month and each Deacon is assigned a specific Sunday.

Besides greeting members and visitors as they arrive, the Deacon also has the responsibility to see that everyone who has been assigned to take part in the service has arrived on time and that everything is properly set up for the service. This includes: seeing that the candles are lit, the numbers for the hymns to be sung have been posted, the altar is properly set up for communion, and if the Pastor is in need of anything not covered. In the event that a volunteer has not arrived, it is the Deacon's responsibility to find a substitute and in the rare case that a substitute cannot be found, the Deacon will perform that function.

Periodically, the Deacons will contact members who have not attended recently to let them know we're thinking of them and to inform them of any upcoming events that they may want to attend. These may include special luncheons, picnics, guest Pastors or speakers, the Christmas Concert, or the schedules for evening services during Advent and Lent, Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve.

Our main function is to assist the Pastor and take care of the needs of the members. If a member needs something special for a child, an elderly person, or a disabled person, the Deacon will do what can be done to accommodate them. When a member wishes to talk to the Pastor, they can inform a Deacon who will convey the message to the Pastor, and if the Pastor wants something done in a particular way, he can tell the Deacon and the Deacon will carry it out.

Some of the directives in the past have been: don't let too many people congregate in the Narthex before the service, steer them into Fellowship Hall; see if newcomers would like someone to talk to or sit with and, if so, arrange it; find appropriate sponsors for the new members; etc.

In general, the Deacons' function is to help everyone feel welcome and to have a pleasant experience with us.
