In this season of Advent...

And there was no room for them in the inn. (Luke 2.7)

Well, ready or not, here I go into my first December at First Saint Paul's, as I eagerly look forward to experiencing the sentiment expressed in the old familiar song, "It's the most wonderful time of the year." Indeed, from my pastor's perspective, I do have a sense of wonder as I consider my new surroundings here in the big city. The atmosphere is going to be very different, and above all my sense of wonder is focused on the thousands of people in the nearby condos and apartments. And I wonder: How many of them will be spending Christmas by themselves? Also, I wonder: How many will be here and far away from family and friends back home? Further, I wonder about how many are yearning to find a fellowship of believers which has room for them?

Years ago, before GPS when our family went on vacation trips, we would look forward to finding a nice motel with a swimming pool. However, there were times of letdown in seeing only the lit sign, "No vacancy." Then we'd be stuck looking for whatever we could—and doesn't that scenario find a parallel in the Christmas story? No vacancy at the Hotel Bethlehem! The two pilgrims Mary and Joseph found themselves far away from home and the inn had no rooms available. Can you imagine their stress with the baby on the way? No running water, no bed, no midwife. Our images of the scene are often so air-brushed that we fail to appreciate their dilemma.

Why do I share this with you? As I prepare for the special celebrations and worship services later this month, my biggest concern is: Will there be no room at the inn of First Saint Paul's? I ask this because, more than any other church I've been involved with, there are going to be many pilgrims, far away from home who are going to step into the inn of First Saint Paul's. Now, of course, there will be

room in our narthex and worship space, but will there be room in the inn of our hearts? Those people at the Hotel of Bethlehem were busy – caught up with the cares and anxieties of life. So much so, they had no time for Joseph and his pregnant wife. Will there be visitors coming to First Saint Paul's who are pregnant with life's cares? There might well be, and so how important it is to give each person a firm handshake, make eye contact, and be sincere. And please note this: At any gathering you will find two types of people who arrive with one of two attitudes:

I'm so glad to see you! Or I'm so glad you see me!

Do you see the difference? The pilgrims coming into the inn of First Saint Paul's yearn to know that you notice them. It can produce long lasting effects when you really care enough to get beyond the accustomed greeting and engage in a conversation. "Somebody paid attention to me," they say to themselves.

Back in 1965, the Andersonville Methodist Church in Sumter, Georgia received a \$178,000 donation from a New Jersey resident, Robert Brown. Mr. Brown wrote that he had been impressed by the congregation's welcome during a one-time visit many years earlier.

Please know I'm not saying we greet others with the prospect of getting money. Rather, may we greet visitors to experience the joy of showing people that they matter. They sense that there is room in the inn of our hearts. It may seem like a small thing to you but it may be huge to them, and remember the words of our Lord: "I was a stranger and you made me welcome ... As you've done to the least of these, you've done it unto Me."

Christmas Concert 2022 How Shall We Approach This Wonder?

First Saint Paul's annual Christmas Concert will take place on **Sunday, December 11, 3:00 pm**. The annual Christmas concert is a tradition at First Saint Paul's that goes back over forty years, but has even longer roots in our congregation. This is a wonderful treasury of music and outreach to the local community!

How Shall We Approach This Wonder? is a relatively new choir anthem by the poet Kris Kuhn and composer Carl Schalk. It seeks to ask us: is the birth of Jesus something that is just for individuals, or do we share the good news of God-with-us with the world? Combined with other hymns, anthems, and carols, the Concert will present the Christmas story and how we respond in various way.

As in past years, the concert will include several meditation reflections, choral pieces, instrumental works, and hymns for the assembly. Pieces familiar to many include "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence" by Gustav Holst, Handel's "And the Glory of the Lord" from Messiah, the early American "Hail, Thou Blest Morn," and Holst's "Christmas Day," a piece incorporating four familiar Christmas tunes. We will also include three Christmas pieces of Ralph Vaughan Williams in recognition of the 150th anniversary of the composer's birth.

We will be led by a fine orchestra of players familiar to First Saint Paul's, as well as by organ, piano, and harp. There will be many opportunities for the congregation to sing familiar carols. We hope that members and friends of First Saint Paul's will make plans to attend the concert this year.

Following the concert, we will again have the lovely candlelight reception in fellowship hall. This opportunity to

gather is perhaps as enjoyable as the concert itself! Bakers: we welcome your holiday cookies, bars, and breads! There will be a sign-up at church so that we can plan for the reception.

Presenting fine music with orchestra and guests for the Christmas concert takes significant financial support. Members and friends have been generous with their support through the years, and we invite you to participate once again. We have four levels of giving, traditionally named for various ranks of angels: angels (to \$49); archangels (\$50-149); cherubim (\$150 – 299); and Seraphim (\$300 and over).

Your Christmas gift also provides music for the Christmas Eve service, when we will once again have the marvelous Metropolis String Quartet playing preservice and accompanying hymns and choir in the service.

Once again, we hope that you will make plans to attend the Christmas concert on December 11 and festival services of the season.

Architecture Students Sketch at First Saint Paul's

On November 15, 2022 we welcomed Professor David Langdon and nearly 150 of his students to our building. Professor Langdon teaches at the College of Architecture at the Illinois Institute of Technology. His Introduction to Architecture lecture course visits notable Chicago buildings and locations each week to give freshman students and opportunity to practice drawing. Professor Langdon expressed his thanks, writing, "Thank you so much for allowing our students to visit First St. Paul's today, and Jen, your introduction to the church was wonderful and educational and really brought the church to life."

The students came in two sections, one morning and one afternoon, and were met by Jen Masengarb, who gave them background on the building, Edward Dart, and the history of First Saint Paul's. The students then had time to complete their drawing assignments.
