Happy New Year!

Let everyone submit to the governing authorities, since there is no authority except from God, and the authorities that exist are instituted by God. (Romans 13:1)

Back in mid-November, I was encouraged when viewing a Town Hall meeting on CNN. Host Jake Tappert moderated the proceedings in which former Vice President Mike Pence fielded questions from a diverse audience. What impressed me was the atmosphere. It was not the tense "gotcha" mentality that has marked political discourse as of late, where it's all about scoring points against your opponent. Instead, the dialogue was marked by substance in delving into complex issues, and my biggest takeaway was Mike Pence's stress of a need to return to civility in American politics.

Civility. Isn't that a novel term these days? Doesn't it have a nice ring to it versus the increasing volume and harshness which characterize the rhetoric all too often prevalent in our national discourse? Wouldn't that make an excellent New Year's Resolution – to be more civil? In fact, St. Paul's admonition from the book of Romans urges us to realize that civility begins with the agents at the top. We are to respect the governing authorities which God has established. Indeed, our Lord Jesus modeled respect in His dealings with the Jewish leader Nicodemus, the Roman Centurion, and even the oppressive Roman government as He declared: "Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's." In short, Jesus honored the dignity of every person, whether He agreed with them or not. He would not found His Kingdom on the basis of race, class, or political affiliation. Anyone made in the image of God was welcome to join His Kingdom.

Civility and respect – they form a good model for our behavior toward those who are in authority. Yet this does not mean that we roll over to them. Care must be taken not to slavishly or sheepishly obey the authorities when it comes to the infringement of our human rights. Do we have rights? Genesis 1:26-27 tells us that God made all human beings "in His image." Because of this, every human life is sacred and inviolable, and every person has a dignity and worth which must be respected. It's the basis for our Constitution's Bill of Rights, and it is in this area where the rubber meets the road with issues like the right to life for the unborn child, or in the area of freedom to assemble for worship. How is it that Covid restrictions allowed liquor stores and strip clubs to remain open but not churches? Don't such mandates cross over the line as when used for increased government surveillance and the possible curtailing of human freedoms (as in China)? So often freedom is put into jeopardy through the excuse of maintaining security. Is there

not a place for civil disobedience to curtail government infringements? Acts 5:29 finds St. Peter speaking out against overreach from the Jewish rulers.

Yes, we should respect and pray for leaders, but also never forget that they are limited human beings subject to appetites, pressures, and irrationality. Thus, we should not be shocked or disillusioned if it's revealed they have feet of clay. Nor should we be blasé. How important to maintain a counterpoise to avoid looking on them as more-than-God with adulation versus veering to the other extreme of bitter cynicism.

Truly, the Biblical view is uniquely balanced and it is marked by virtue as our Lord Jesus provides us with the model of respect for the dignity of every person. God grant us the grace of civility rather than joining in on the politics of polarization. May we show love for the woman who has just emerged from the abortion clinic (and, yes, even her doctor). Jesus' love cuts across distinctions and dispenses grace. From Him we learn that whatever activism we get involved in, it must not drive out love, humility, or civility. Pray for His wisdom as you navigate through 2023.

Report & Request from the Call Committee

As of December, the Call Committee had completed preliminary interviews with all pastoral candidates who were deemed to most closely fit our congregational profile and possess the set of skills the congregation has identified as important.

The Call Committee has now begun scheduling in-person meetings with these candidates, inviting the candidates and their spouses to Chicago. After completing these meetings, the Call Committee will be ready to submit its recommendation to the Church Council. After clearing the Church Council, the Call Committee will present a recommendation to the Voters' Assembly. Ultimately, the Voters' Assembly will vote to decide which pastoral candidate to call as FSP's full-time pastor.

To help defray the costs of flying candidates and their spouses to Chicago, the Call Committee is seeking a member or members willing to donate their frequent-flyer miles. If you are willing to do so, please speak to one of the members of the Call Committee or contact Lydia in the church office. Your donation will be greatly appreciated.



Organ Anniversary

Did you know that the organ at First Saint Paul's is now fifty years old?

It was installed in the fall of 1972, and dedicated by the renowned Lutheran organist Paul Manz in a recital program on February 4, 1973. The organ was built by the Schlicker Organ Company of Buffalo, NY, one of the leading organ builders at that time.

While the organ is similar to other small instruments, it was designed and built for the sanctuary at First Saint Paul's. Dr. Paul Bunjes of Concordia (then Teachers College) was the consultant and "designer" of the organ.

Composer Anniversary

This year marks the 100th anniversary of the birth of composer Richard Hillert (1923–2010), who was professor of music at Concordia-Chicago for many years. Hillert's name is well-known throughout the United States and beyond, primarily for his setting of the liturgy that we call Divine Service 1, from which comes "This is the feast of victory for our God."

Hillert wrote many hymns and choral anthems; two of those anthems were sung at the recent Christmas concert. For the 150th anniversary of First Saint Paul's in 1996, Hillert was commissioned to write a suite of movements for strings subtitled appropriately "Sesquicentennial on LaSalle."

During this year we will have opportunity to hear other selections from Hillert's substantial catalog of works.
