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As a youth, were you one of the popular kids? I wasn't, but I yearned to be. However, due to my strict upbringing, I was more introverted and lacking in self-confidence. This made it a challenge for me on the dating scene for many years. I'd clam up until a friend of mine taught me the value of asking questions. It was a game-changer. Asking questions brought me out of my clamshell and it also worked to bring the other person out of his or her self-imposed shell. Indeed, it's something that I've found extremely beneficial for my work of ministry through the years. Moreover, I discovered that the key to asking good questions is curiosity. Curiosity can make all the difference in the world in facilitating meaningful conversations.

Back in 2009, researchers at the California Institute of Technology recorded brain activity using MRIs while subjects considered a variety of questions. After reading each question, the subjects would silently guess the answer and then rate how curious they were to know the correct answer. The study showed that a high level of curiosity correlated directly with a high level of brain activity. The researchers concluded that curiosity plays a critical role in motivating learning and discovery.

Shades of Curious George! Our amazing omniscient God has shaped us with a sense of wonder and an appetite to discover more about His creation. He has hard -wired us to be naturally curious – to want to learn new things. This curiosity compels us to ask questions to investigate, to seek to understand.

Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of others. In our relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus. (Philippians 2.3-5)

Have you ever thought how this understanding could be a real boost to your Christian walk as a committed believer? Curiosity, as it relates to relationships, is the humble and sincere interest to know and care more about another person and his or her thoughts. Moreover, the way our curiosity is best demonstrated is through asking good questions. Asking good questions from genuine interest builds connection. Throughout Scripture, we discover God asking people questions. It began with Adam and Eve and it was part of carrying out His plan to restore people into full connection and relationship with Him.

Do you see the great opportunity for us in following God's example? Haven't we all heard this exhortation from the pulpit? "You people need to tell others about Jesus." Yet all too often this is easier said than done. We don't know where to start, but could this be the great open door? Our questions to those alienated from

God can be the bridge that moves us from silently noticing to actively engaging with them. It's what St. Paul was encouraging in the Philippians 2 passage (above) that we consider others and their interests.

May you take the time to learn how to more effectively express your curiosity to others. It can begin with casual phrases like: "I couldn't help noticing ...", "I'm wondering ...", or I'm curious..." Your simple, humble interest is appealing to people; they will often be drawn to it. As you allow your Spirit-led curiosity to enter into conversations, you will find that the way becomes open to ask more profound questions. Your effort in activating curiosity in others can lead them to pursue life-changing answers for themselves.

So, note well! We are hard-wired by our awesome Creator to be naturally interested in learning more about people and His creation. Our curiosity and question-asking can be cultivated through practice and intentionality. Pay no attention to the adage "curiosity killed the cat." Through meaningful questions we demonstrate the Spirit of Christ in honestly seeking to understand, know, and love others. So ask away!

Social Ministry at First Saint Paul's

We are in the process of meeting with several organizations to incorporate their offerings for the guests we serve directly and through our existing service partners, such as Chicago Help Initiative (CHI) and Lutheran Church Charities.

Food-To-Donate: This national organization represents various restaurant chains and coordinates their food donations. Beginning in February, we will receive donations from local Insomnia Cookies stores, frozen burger patties and apple pies from McDonald's, and chicken from Chick-fil-A. Other chains will be added over time.

Instacart: National grocery shopping and delivery company. They have food donation "wish list" program. We would like to use their program for our homebound members and for augmenting meal needs in general.

River City Church, Humbolt Park: They operate an apprenticeship program to teach job skills in the trades and to help their trainees find jobs. The apprenticeship program is pertinent for a subset of our community meals guests. We will be the conduit to this and other of their programs as appropriate.

Christ The King Lutheran Church is now a periodic recipient of bagged meals collected at FSP's on Wednesdays and delivered by CHI drivers.

Renew Chicago raises volunteer and financial support to benefit those in need within the 77 neighborhoods of Chicago. Doug Fraser of CHI and Mike Cacicio met with Renew Chicago's director and are now in the process of integrating our respective services.

Finally, a service partnership meeting with **Covenant House** is forthcoming. They provide shelter for homeless youth. We hope to take part in their ministry.

ONGOING OPERATIONS

Our Saturday meals program and monthly Foot Clinic continue to serve our guests. Two to three Saturdays a month we offer various social work services (such as acquiring photo identification cards) and nurse practitioner services via on-site Chicago Help Initiative staff members.

We continue to receive and redistribute between 250 and 400 bagged meals every Wednesday morning.

We receive, organize and distribute hundreds of pairs of gently used shoes each month, along with a healthy amount of coats, hats, gloves, scarfs, socks, and toiletries.

FSP's hosts between 60-100 AA members across two meetings every Sunday. The need for more meeting times/days exists. Planning to meet this demand is in progress.

Lenten Daily Devotions

Several different Lenten daily devotion booklets will be available, including one written by Reed Lessing. Look for them in the narthex beginning on Ash Wednesday and help yourself.

The season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday (February 22), a day of repentance and reflection. Lent lasts forty days (not counting Sundays), reflecting the forty days of Jesus's time in the wilderness after his baptism and the forty years of Israel's wandering in the wilderness.

We will have a service of imposition of ashes and holy communion on Ash Wednesday at 7:00 pm. In Holy Week, the services on Maundy Thursday (April 6) and Good Friday (April 7) will also be at 7:00 pm. There will be no mid-week evening services this year. However, we will have mid-week Lenten meditations that will be sent out each Wednesday.
